

#### Rebates Available To Members

## **Electric Heating Equipment Rebate** Members may be eligible for a \$600

rebate for the installation of an electric heat pump system or \$300 for a ductless system. The structure must receive electric service from the cooperative. Low-interest loans are also available for the installation of electric heating equipment.

#### **Water Heater Rebates**

Members could receive a rebate of \$9 per gallon of capacity, provided the water heater meets specified requirements. The water heater must have at least 50 gallons of capacity, a minimum 10-year warranty and it must be hooked up to the cooperative's load management system.

### Third-Party Irrigation/Grain Bin Dryer Management Systems

Members may be eligible for a \$750 rebate for a third-party managed irrigation or grain drying system. The equipment must meet specified requirements and it must be hooked up to the cooperative's load management system.





#### Call Before Installing Wind, Solar, Battery Storage


We strongly recommend that you call Central Electric before committing to a wind, solar or battery project. We want to provide you with the most current information and requirements for interconnecting your system to ours. It's also important to review the compensation for electric energy that is sold back to the cooperative. You can find this information on our website under the distributed energy section; however, we encourage an in-person meeting to review the process to help prevent expensive mistakes. We look forward to working with you before you start a distributed energy project.



# **Operation Round-Up**

In 2024, Central Electric members and employees gave \$31,600 to local projects through Operation Round-Up. This is a voluntary program in which members round their monthly electric bill up to the next dollar.

Operation Round-Up applications are reviewed twice each year. Organizations that have received funding in recent years include nonprofit groups, senior citizen groups, youth clubs, food pantries, fire departments, cemeteries, daycares and municipalities.

Since 2016, approximately \$225,000 has been awarded to support local projects.
